## Spring Traffic Safety Campaigns Kick Off at CFAY and Yokosuka

**K**anagawa Prefecture is urging drivers, cyclists and pedestrians to sharpen their awareness during the 2026 Spring National Traffic Safety Campaign, running April 6 through 15. The 10-day campaign, coordinated by the Kanagawa Prefecture Traffic Safety Measures Council, carries the slogan "Protect new school children and kindergarteners from traffic accidents" - a timely reminder as the Japanese school year begins and young children navigate unfamiliar routes for the first time.

April 10 holds special significance within the campaign as Japan's nationally designated "Aim for Zero Traffic Fatalities Day." The Cabinet Office established the observance in 2008 as a citizens' movement to heighten public consciousness around traffic safety. The date was chosen because it ends in zero, reinforcing the aspiration for zero fatalities on the road. The designation is observed twice more each year on Feb. 20 and Sept. 30, for the same symbolic reason.

The spring campaign centers on four focus areas that apply to everyone in the community, whether driving, riding or walking.

#### **Pedestrian safety on school routes and residential roads.**

With new first graders and kindergarteners beginning to walk to school, the campaign calls for increased watch and patrol activities along routes where children travel in groups. Drivers should be mindful that pedestrians have priority at crosswalks, while pedestrians should be encouraged to use crosswalks, avoid jaywalking, and wear reflective materials during low-light hours.

#### **Eliminating distracted driving and smartphone use.**

The campaign targets the dangers of using smartphones while both driving and walking. In Japan, holding a phone or viewing a screen while operating a vehicle carries penalties of up to six months' imprisonment or a fine of up to ¥100,000. Pedestrians also bear responsibility: walking while staring at a phone reduces peripheral awareness at crosswalks and intersections. Community members should stop and step aside when they need to

check a device rather than reading or texting in motion. Drivers approaching crosswalks where a pedestrian is waiting must come to a full stop and yield, failure to do so is a traffic violation under Japanese law.

The campaign also calls for a social environment where drunk driving is never tolerated. Japan's laws hold all parties accountable, not just the driver, but passengers who knowingly ride with an impaired driver and individuals who serve alcohol to someone who will drive. The campaign further emphasizes seatbelt use in all seating positions, including rear seats, and proper use of child safety seats. Rear-seat seatbelt compliance remains lower than in front seats across Japan, yet unbelted rear passengers still face serious risk in a collision and can injure front-seat occupants on impact.

#### **Bicycle and e-scooter rule compliance.**

The Kanagawa Prefecture Traffic Safety Campaign further outlines five rules for riding a bicycle safely that community members should familiarize themselves with: ride on the left side of the road, obey traffic signals and stop signs, use a light at night, never ride under the influence of alcohol, and wear a helmet. In Japan, cyclists travel on the left and should check for safety by looking right first.

This year's campaign arrives alongside a major enforcement change. As of April 1, Japan's Traffic Violation Penalty Notice System, commonly known as the "Blue Ticket" system will be enforcing monetary fines for bicycle traffic violations committed by riders aged 16 and older. Previously, most bicycle infractions were handled through either simple warnings or far more serious criminal proceedings.

Under the new system, police can issue penalty notices for violations ranging from riding while using a cellphone (¥12,000 fine) to ignoring traffic signals or failing to stop at intersections (¥5,000 to ¥6,000). Fines must be paid within seven days. Failure to pay can escalate the matter to criminal proceedings and a potential criminal record. Riders who commit two or more dangerous violations within three years will be required to complete a mandatory cyclist training course.

## Motorcycle accident prevention.

Riders are reminded of the inherent risks of two-wheeled vehicles, which include, reduced visibility to other drivers, susceptibility to road surface hazards, and vehicle blind spots, particularly in the narrow streets and dense intersections around Yokosuka. Two accident types account for a disproportionate share of motorcycle fatalities in Japan: single-vehicle accidents where a rider loses control, and collisions between right-turning vehicles and oncoming motorcycles traveling straight. In left-hand-traffic Japan, this means a vehicle turning right across oncoming traffic may fail to see an approaching motorcycle. Riders should assume they are not seen and approach intersections prepared to brake, even when they have the right of way.

Proper helmet use remains the single most effective protective measure as many fatal bicycle and motorcycle accidents in Japan involve head injuries. A helmet only works if it fits correctly and the chin strap is securely fastened. A loose strap can allow it to shift or come off during impact. Riders should also consider chest, back and joint protectors, and regardless of experience level, conduct a pre-ride check of tires, brakes, lights and mirrors before each ride.

Local municipalities across the prefecture are stepping up patrols and educational efforts to align with the spring campaign and ensure compliance. To support these efforts, educational materials in both Japanese and English are available, including:

## CFAY Street Safety Campaign

CFAY will conduct an on-base Street Safety Campaign on April 21 from 6:30 to 8 a.m. and April 22 from 3:30 to 5 p.m.

The campaign's purpose is education, not enforcement. Volunteers and safety representatives will be stationed at three key intersections on base to observe and educate community members on safe practices for bicycling, crossing streets, skateboarding, running and jogging.

At crosswalks, observers will check that cyclists, skateboarders and scooter riders dismount and walk across, and that no one is using listening devices while crossing. In bicycle lanes, they will ensure riders are traveling on the proper side of the street and wearing helmets properly. Observers will raise awareness that sidewalks are reserved for pedestrians and skateboarders riders while verifying that helmets are worn while riding skateboards or scooters, and that listening devices are not in use.

Volunteers interested in participating in the campaign should provide their name, contact information and preferred date to [cfaytrafficsafety@us.navy.mil](mailto:cfaytrafficsafety@us.navy.mil) no later than noon on April 17. The safety office will provide safety vests and bilingual handouts for distribution at each checkpoint. All volunteers will be recognized with safety awards in accordance with CFAYINST 5100.10A.

## Introduction of Blue Tickets

The Government of Japan began enforcing a new system of traffic tickets, known as "blue tickets," issued to cyclists for violations.

### • Affected group

This applies to all bicycle riders aged 16 and older.

### • Targeted violations

The system focus on dangerous violations such as ignoring traffic lights, failing to stop at stop signs, and riding on the wrong side of the road, etc...

### • Penalties

Violators are subject to fines.

### • Objective

The primary goal is to decrease the number of bicycle-related accidents and enhance overall road safety.

### Violations subject to blue tickets

When identifying a traffic offence committed by a cyclist, police officers generally give a warning at the scene. However, if the offence is malicious and dangerous enough to pose a significant danger and nuisance to other pedestrians or vehicles and to create a risk of traffic accidents, police officers issue a blue tickets.

<b>Disobeying traffic signals</b> ¥6,000 ¥5,000 for running flashing signals	<b>Stop sign violation</b> ¥5,000	<b>Driving on the wrong side of the road</b> ¥6,000
<b>Use of mobile phone, etc. (Holding)</b> ¥12,000	<b>Trespassing at a closed level of crossing</b> ¥7,000	<b>Defective braking system</b> ¥5,000

These violations are examples.

In case of committing serious violations\*, or causing accidents, offenders are subject to criminal procedures (issuance or reed tickets)  
 \*Drink driving, driving under influence of alcohol, obstructive driving, use of mobile phones (causing a danger to traffic)

**In addition:** If a person caused a traffic accident or is caught two or more times within three years for any of the 16 types of traffic offences including running a red light, etc, the Prefectural Public Safety Commission orders the person to attend a "Lecture for Cyclists".

# 2026 Road Tax Season

Effective June 1, 2026, all vehicles **MUST** display the 2026 (Reiwa 8) USFJ Decal. Displaying 2025 decals after June 1 will result in denial of access and possible impoundment. **Pay the Japanese road tax to receive your new decal(s).**



## One Stop Shop

### When?

• April 9 (Thursday), 10 (Friday) from 9 to 11:45 a.m./1 to 3:15 p.m. for 100, 300 through 529 plates only. Pay Road Tax and get USFJ decal at Fleet Theater.

• This event is **NOT** for yellow plate car and motorcycle. Road Tax for yellow plate cars and motorcycles must be paid off base at Yokosuka City Hall starting April 1

• If you have a yellow plate car or motorcycle as an additional vehicle, you must wait until April 1 to receive decals.

• If you miss the events, pay your Road Tax at the Kanagawa Tax Office for normal and large vehicles, or pay your Road Tax at the Yokosuka City Hall for mini cars and motorcycles 125cc and above. Bring your documents to receive decal at VRO.

### What to bring to pay road tax?

- 2025 Road Tax Receipt (last years)
- Japanese Vehicle Title
- Applicable Fees in YEN

### What to bring to get decal?

- ID Card
- 2025 road tax receipt
- Japanese Vehicle Title
- Vehicle inspection report
- Base Inspection Sheet (if applicable)
- JCI Insurance
- Liability Insurance
- Parking Certificate with current residence (must be re-registered at LTO with the current address)

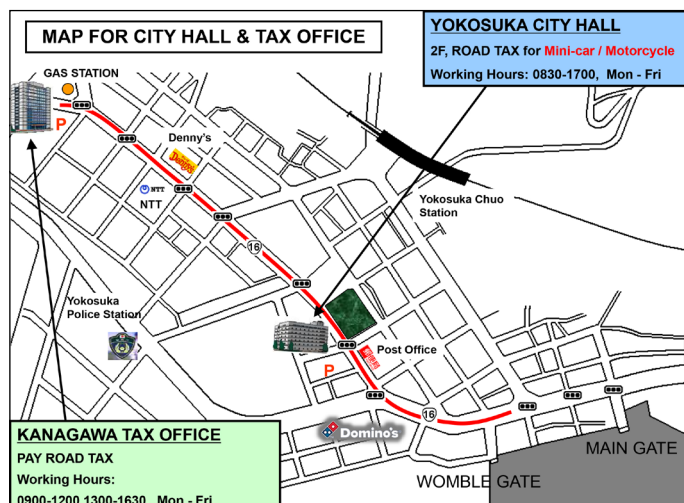
- Valid Drivers license (if you own more than one vehicle, bring all additional driver's license)

Notes: Representatives other than Spouse are required to present a Power of Attorney (POA) to receive decals. If member owns more than one vehicle, all vehicles **must** be registered at the **same time** to receive decals.

• License plate from other prefectures as Sasebo, Iwakuni, Misawa, Yokota, Fuji, etc... need to be changed to Yokohama plate before March 31, 2026.

You can't pay Road tax at Kanagawa prefecture after April 1, 2026.

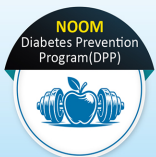

## Oooka River Sakura Festival Until April 5 (Sunday)

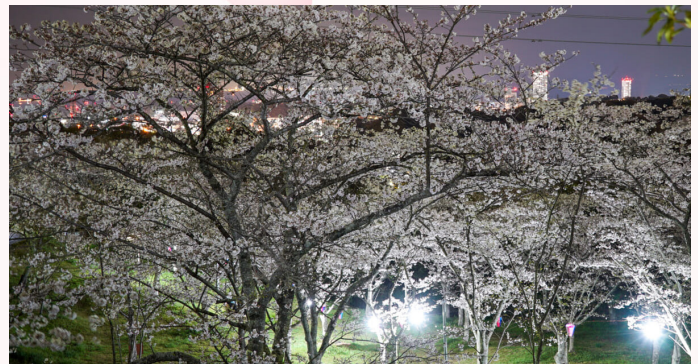
There will be food trucks. Paid parking available.

## VIPRR SERVICES RETURNING FOR PHAS

The Defense Health Agency's (DHA) Virtual Integrated Patient Readiness and Remote Referral (VIPRR) program will be available again for a temporary 90-day period to assist Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) tenant commands with Periodic Health Assessments (PHA).

### Important Update for Sailors in Japan:

While the program has been approved, some CFAY tenant command UICs have not yet been loaded into the VIPRR system. VIPRR is currently updating the database and expects Japan-based UICs to begin appearing in the system starting next week. They anticipate being caught up by the end of this week (East Coast time).

### How to use VIPRR for your PHA:

1. Complete the online PHA first <https://eha.health.mil/EHA/>
2. Call VIPRR to schedule your appointment, 1-844-863-3236

### Hours of operation

Monday–Friday, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. (Central Standard Time)

• If you already have a scheduled PHA appointment but need an earlier date, VIPRR may be able to assist once your UIC is available in the system. VIPRR access will be authorized for 90 days while DHA evaluates continuation of the program.

## CONSTRUCTION AND CLOSURES
